

In Literacy, as this week was the anniversary of the time when the Duff children went missing it was apt for us to be reading the story and completing our comprehension tasks. The children found writing about how they would survive 8 days and nights in the bush a challenge, they felt they would be rescued after one day. With the parent/teacher interviews coming up the children were asked to explain how they thought they were doing at school in Literacy and Maths. They found it hard to say what they were good at.

In Mathematics we revisited multiplication by 1 digit and then multiplying by 10 and 100. It was not easy for some to see that if $25 \times 3 = 75$, then 25 by 30 would be 750 and 25×300 would be 7500. We also have some additional challenges of understanding base numbers and indices and what you do with them if you multiply 2 components or divide 2 components. This is particularly for those who are ready for Year 7 preparation.

We've been delighted to have everyone back at school this week, and we've used our time productively.


In our literacy sessions, we've been introduced to a new character in *The One and Only Ivan*. Some of us are beginning to find the book quite sad, so we're hopeful for some happier moments for the characters in the upcoming chapters. Although the storyline is easy to follow, we've been discovering a lot of rich vocabulary that we've discussed and incorporated into our understanding. Over the past two weeks, we've also had guided reading sessions as a class, using sports-themed texts to tie in with the Olympic celebrations. In our writing sessions, we've finalised all of our explanation texts and are currently working on a creative piece inspired by our recent author chat with Andy Griffiths.

This week, we've focused on enhancing our understanding of time, particularly digital time. This is a tricky concept, and we needed a lot of hands-on practice with clocks and mini white-boards before attempting to write it. We also learned a new maths game called Total Recall, using cards and dice to enhance mathematical thinking.

We celebrated Science Week with the theme "Species Survival: More Than Just Sustainability." In addition to taking school photos, we marked Science Week by watching a PowerPoint presentation that explained the work being done in STEM to help preserve our environment for future generations. We also completed some enjoyable tasks related to this theme.
